

Early Childhood Programs

- Partner with schools and other early learning providers to expand program capacity
 - United Way grants
 - Born Learning programs Women United
 - State/Federal early childhood programs
 - Wrap services with third party providers
 - Prior to the pandemic-14% of children entering Kindergarten were not prepared
 - Chamber advocates for universal funding and eliminating cliff effect for child care funding



Learning to Read/Other Programs

- Programming coordinated in schools with supports and volunteers
 - Read to Lead volunteers through United Way
- Expansion of out-of-school collaborative partnerships to provide reading programs along with other activities and meals
- Pre-pandemic 32% of 3rd graders were not proficient in reading
- Challenge 5 media program to promote the importance of student attendance
- Spring Forward Learning Center's Summer Program
 - National Summer Learning Association Best Practice





- A data warehouse system is in place gathering millions of data points to analyze and predict student success
 - Collaborative effort of seven school districts
 - United Way lead convener and funder
 - St. Ambrose University maintains system
 - Looking to add data from non-profits



Future Post-Pandemic

- Analyze learning loss through data warehouse system to inform next steps
- Provide additional opportunities for students evidencing learning loss
- Using Data warehouse to determine root causes for opportunity gap for African American readers









History of the Program

- This program began in the SCCSD in 2017-18 school
- The in-person parent workshops grew each year, with more than 100 families linked to ten Title I schools receiving the training in the 2018-19 school year
- With Covid-19, the program had the following shifts:

 - Materials are shipped directly to homes
 - Families must complete the online workshops to get materials

Raise Me to Read Goals

SCHOOL READINESS: Increase number/percentage of children ready for kindergarten as measured by an appropriate evaluation tool.

OUT OF SCHOOL LEARNING: Increase the number/percentage of children who demonstrate evidence of sustained or improved reading proficiency from one year to the next.

SCHOOL ATTENDANCE: Increase the number/percentage of preschool – third-grade children who are present in school 95% of school days.

GRADE LEVEL READING: Increase number/percentage of children who are reading proficiently by the end of third grade.


INTERRUPTING CHILDHOOD & GENERATIONAL

POVERTY: Increase number/percentage of children 5 and under who are living above the poverty level.









Big Ideas

- 1. In Iowa we talk about accelerating learning rather than learning loss.
- 2. We have **every reason to be optimistic** about Iowa data on student learning from the 2020-2021 school year.
 - a. Iowa students were in school in some form almost everywhere in the state, whether hybrid or in-person, nearly all year
 - b. We had high participation in assessments
 - c. We **turned to focus on instruction** well before the national conversation changed. In fact...the national conversation has not changed.
- 2. We still have significant achievement gaps and some may have been exacerbated by our experience during the pandemic.

Future Ready Iowa: Department Goals

- 1. All learners enter kindergarten ready to learn;
- 2. All learners are educated in safe, healthy, and caring learning environments;
- 3. All learners are proficient readers by the end of 3rd grade;
- 4. All learners progress in Iowa academic and career technical content and early learning areas from year to year at a rate that ensures successful preparation after high school;
- 5. All learners have equitable opportunities for learning and growth regardless of their ability or disability, socioeconomic status, race, ethnicity, or any other trait;
- 6. All learners graduate from high school ready to be successful in their college and career pathways;
- 7. All adult learners lacking basic education and literacy skills have access to affordable, quality instruction preparing them to enter the workforce or continue their education;
- 8. All learners will be prepared for productive, rewarding careers contributing to the vitality of their communities; and
- 9. All community college graduates are ready to succeed in their chosen career and/or at their chosen transfer institution






